## Back and Forth in Time


As a little girl, Barbara Sullivan lived in Glenvale, California, for most of the year. But she considered herself lucky when her family spent two weeks each August in Roxbury. They would visit the Grandparents from the time she was two years old in the early 50s, until 1961


She loved coming here. She stayed with her family in Charles and Edith Sullivan's home. That particular house is no longer here—but you can face the school, and imagine it standing just opposite you, in the very left-hand corner of the schoolyard where Tracy Hill Road joins 12A.

(In 1971, when she returned for one of her visits, she was sad to see the house's windows broken, the place "a mess").

Barbara talked about how it felt to live in the village in the summertime. People up and down the main street were always friendly. She was fascinated to learn that that the Post Office was actually located in somebody's house! And that the schoolhouse consisted of only one room. And that they lived so close to the whistle and roar of the trains passing through.

Most wonderful of all, the tall elm trees lining Main Street formed a gorgeous canopy shading the entire village.

## From the Town Clerk's Office

#### **2023 DOG LICENSES**

It is time to license your dog(s). The deadline is April 1st. The cost is \$9.00 for a neutered dog and \$13.00 for an unneutered dog. After April 1st the cost will be \$11.00 for a neutered dog and \$17.00 for an unneutered dog. It is the law of the State of Vermont to license dogs annually. Owners of unlicensed dogs can be fined up to \$500 and/or the dog(s) could be impounded and destroyed.

It is the law of the State of Vermont that all dogs should be vaccinated every three years, but the first vaccination is only good for one year.

#### **TAXES**

The next property tax installment is due on May 12, 2023. The office will be open until 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. The Town accepts postmarked envelopes.

#### SUMMER HOURS

Summer hours will begin May 6th. The Town Office will close at noon on Fridays (except for the day property taxes are due). Summer hours will end the last Friday of September.

Town Meeting was held on March 7th. 312 votes were cast via Australian ballot (119 in person and 193 at the polls). 71 voters attended Town Meeting.

I would like to send a thank you out to Sam Twombly for his years serving as Roxbury's Delinquent Tax Collector; Ed Carney for his years on the Board of Library Trustees; and to Ryan Johns for the time he was on the Selectboard.

All articles passed but some were amended by increasing the

financial amount. Article 20 also passed, which disapproved the Junk Ordinance.

The Montpelier/Roxbury School District meeting was also held on March 7th.

The combination of Montpelier and Roxbury votes passed all articles.

The Central Vermont Career Center articles passed. The Central Vermont Career Center consists of four school districts (eighteen towns). Since the ballots were combined, there is no way to know how Roxbury voters voted.

## (Montpelier-Roxbury Public Schools) Kristen Getler and Rhett Williams

We thank you for coming out to vote and choosing to invest in the Montpelier Roxbury Public Schools (MRPS). The proposed MRPS FY24 budget (\$28,608,500) passed in Roxbury and Montpelier. This budget will result in 9.59% decrease in the tax rate for Roxbury and a 1.37% increase for Montpelier. We look forward to the work ahead, the positive impacts on students based on the priorities in this budget, and hearing from you as we move through the coming year.

The MRPS school board has identified three goal areas for the coming year: closing student achievement and opportunity gaps; belonging, safety, and wellness in the schools; and board communication and accountability. If you're looking for a better understanding of efforts underway at MRPS, there are a number of avenues for you to learn more.

MRPS produces a blog, vlog, and podcast (<a href="https://www.mrpsvt.org/podcast">https://www.mrpsvt.org/podcast</a>). Through these mediums, we hear directly from students, principals, special educators, our superintendent, and more. It's a great way to hear the voices leading and experiencing education at MRPS. You can also follow MRPS on Facebook, Instagram, or Twitter.

The MRPS school board meets the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays @ 6:30 p.m. each month. Every 4th meeting is held at the Roxbury Village School; otherwise meetings are held at Montpelier High School. You are welcome to attend school board meetings in-person or virtually, and you can also access recordings of previous meetings. All school board meeting information can be found at <a href="https://www.mrpsvt.org/agendas-minutes">https://www.mrpsvt.org/agendas-minutes</a>; all school board meetings are videotaped and an archive is available at <a href="https://www.orcamedia.net/series/montpelier-roxbury-school-board">www.orcamedia.net/series/montpelier-roxbury-school-board</a>.

Additionally, all MRPS school board committee meetings are open to the public. Currently active board committees include Negotiations (teacher and staff contracts); Finance; Policy; Equity; Facilities and Energy; and Superintendent Evaluation. Kristen chairs the Facilities and Energy Committee, and serves on the Equity Committee; Rhett serves on the Negotiations, Finance, Policy, and Superintendent Evaluation Committees. MRPS has initiated two audits of district operations that include reviews of (1) our special education programming and (2) educational equity. The MRPS board will receive a

"Special Education 101" presentation at our April 5th meeting, followed by a presentation of the Special Education audit results at our April 19th meeting. The MRPS equity audit will occur over an 8 month period, April - November 2023. Educational equity means that every student has access to the educational resources and rigor they need when they need it across all identities and backgrounds (i.e., race, gender, ethnicity, language, disability, sexual orientation, family background, and/or family income) in order to be successful. The equity audit consultants will engage with MRPS teachers. staff, and broader community through a variety of formats to understand current practices through multiple perspectives; with an emphasis on hearing voices of traditionally underrepresented people including, but not limited to: the BIPOC and LBGTQ+ communities, multilingual families, and families who are eligible to receive free and reduced lunch. Consultants will examine systems currently in place, including established and emerging curriculum documents, teaching practice, flexible pathway opportunities, and systems of student support. If you are interested in learning more about this process, reach out to Kristen.

Following detection of high PCB (polychlorinated biphenyls) levels at what is now the former Burlington High School, the state legislature passed Act 74 in 2021. Act 74 requires all schools constructed or renovated before 1980 to test for PCBs in indoor air and address any PCB levels found at or above the school action level. Lighting ballasts in older fluorescent lighting fixtures and caulk are the common sources of PCBs in school buildings. State agencies are leading the coordination and scheduling of PCB testing at schools. As of this writing, PCB testing has been completed (early march 2023) at Union Elementary School and MSMS with results expected within one month of testing. Testing at RVS is scheduled for January-March 2024 and at MHS for January-March 2025. Notably, as of this writing, the legislature was discussing pausing the PCB testing program. It is widely held that there are inadequate state funds to back up the wide-scale remediation that may result from the mandated testing. Of the 22 Vermont schools tested, eight detected PCB levels that require further action. We will continue to watch this conversation closely. If you are interested in this topic, contact Kristen.

Following advocacy efforts over the past 2 years by the MHS Earth Group and Montpelier Energy Advisory Committee (MEAC), the MRPS school board's Facilities and Energy Committee is working on a resolution to establish goals and a work plan to guide MRPS's transition away from fossil fuels across facilities and operations. In March 2021, the MHS Earth Group requested that the board adopt a net zero policy. In August 2021, MEAC shared the Montpelier Net Zero Action

## Roxbury Village School

Happy Spring, everyone! While we still have a lot of snow on our playground at Roxbury Village School, work is underway to begin planning for our gardens at RVS. We continue to be grateful to our Caregiver Group for all of the support they provide to our school gardens. Facilitating the High Mowing Seed fundraiser, buying supplies, donating time and labor, and organizing our RVS GARDEN DAY are just a few of the examples of how the Caregivers help with our school gardens. Please plan to join us at RVS on Sunday, May 7th, from 1:30-4:30, for a day in the dirt as we prepare the garden beds for planting. This event was well attended last year, and a lot of fun was had by all who were there. This year, our Caregiver Group is hoping to have even more people help with the gardens, and they are planning a barbecue to cap off the day's activities. We look forward to seeing you!

Our preschool students have been busy getting seeds ready for planting. They are preparing ground cherries, kale, carrots, watermelon, pumpkin, birdhouse gourds, and various herbs for tea. Thanks to the generous donations of seeds, soils, and containers from our Caregiver Group, each classroom will take responsibility for starting seeds that will eventually be planted in our school gardens. Students were surveyed to see what they'd most like to eat. From there, the plans made for planting, and food choices were coordinated with Ms. Marion in the kitchen, to ensure that food that is planted in the garden will be gathered, prepared, and served by and for students. In addition, other items to be planted include popcorn, potatoes, zucchini, carrots, beets, radishes, peas, and more. I understand that plans also include pickling cucumbers, as we have a lot of students who love pickles!

Another sign of Spring in Vermont is the start of sugar season. Our Bridges group has been busy tapping a few trees here at RVS. Sap will be gathered and boiled off at school. We are hoping for enough maple syrup to have sugar on snow for students (we know we have enough snow)! The weather has cooperated so far with cooler nights and warmer days. With more daylight in each passing day, we hope everyone is finding more time to enjoy the outdoors. Our students certainly enjoy visiting the forest each Friday to learn about the world around them. They bring the learning back into the classroom with lessons aligned to our science curriculum.

Plan which included recommendations to eliminate oil-based heat at MSMS and MHS. The draft resolution will be considered for review and approval at the April 5th and April 19th school board meetings. If you are interested in learning more about this process, reach out to Kristen.

We are working to re-establish contracts with our teachers and instructional assistants (IAs). We appreciate the skill and hard work of our teachers and we will compensate them fairly. We are restructuring the pay scale for individual assistants (IAs) based on three tiers: classroom IAs, intensive needs IAs, and behavioral IAs. Staff in these categories will be required to maintain training, paid for by the district, which will reinforce the skills needed for each position. We have had a number of open IA positions for a few years now. We hope to increase compensation for individual assistants in order to remain competitive with other school districts and other industries. As of this writing, contracts are still being negotiated. Contact Rhett if you have any questions on this topic.

Caregivers of Roxbury MHS and MSMS students, please be reminded that we advocated for a late bus to serve Roxbury students who participate in after-school activities (i.e. clubs, sports programs, academic support). The bus goes from MHS (6:15pm), to MSMS (6:20pm), with a drop-off at Northfield's South Village Mobil at 6:40pm. We understand there are few riders on this bus route. We hope ridership will be substantial enough to continue justifying the expense. If you have any comments or questions about this bus route, please contact us.

Three student issues we are hearing about from Montpelier-based caregivers are bullying, concern about literacy/reading instruction, and learning loss during Covid. If these issues are challenges coming up for your family, we would like to hear from you.

## Roxbury Volunteer Fire Department

The Roxbury Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD) thanks voters for their approval of Articles 16, 17, and 18 at the March town meeting. Your support enables the department to continue fire and emergency response, conduct training, purchase equipment, and plan for eventual replacement of vehicles.

Recently the RVFD participated in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and automated external defibrillator training (CPR/AED) for response to cardiac or breathing emergency. All department members are now recertified to meet current standards.

Please note that burn permits are required when snow is no longer present at the burning site. 

#### GREEN MOUNTAIN PASSPORT PROGRAM

The Green Mountain Passport Program allows free day-use passes for Vermont State Parks and historic sites. If you are a Vermont resident at least 62 years of age or a Vermont veteran of the uniformed services you are eligible. To enroll in the program, you must complete an application at your Town Clerk's Office and pay a one-time fee of \$2. Once completed you will receive a Green Mountain Passport card which is good for life and is not transferrable. For more information contact the Town Clerk's Office at 485-7840 or stop by.

We have several upcoming events over the next few months we want to bring attention to. The RFL book club is meeting on April 10 at the RFL for a discussion about Ishiguro's book Klara and the Sun. The family traveled South of the village to visit the Fish Hatchery. And North... to Northfield! Back in town, they sat at little tables to drink sodas in the ice cream parlor (imagine the parlor along the right side of what is now the Community Hall/Senior Center).

On Sundays, when Teela Wooket (now Windridge) was a girls-only riding camp, the Catholic girls would come into town each Sunday to worship at the church (the building still standing on one corner of Rte 12A and the Warren Mountain Road).

And then, up the road to Warren, they loved visiting with the Flynns' chickens and three cows.

Two weeks were never long enough for her and her family to visit Vermont—she always wished it could be more.

Barbara has visited Roxbury a number of times, the last being a half-year ago. She said she found Randy and Tammy very helpful! Let's hope she comes again!
